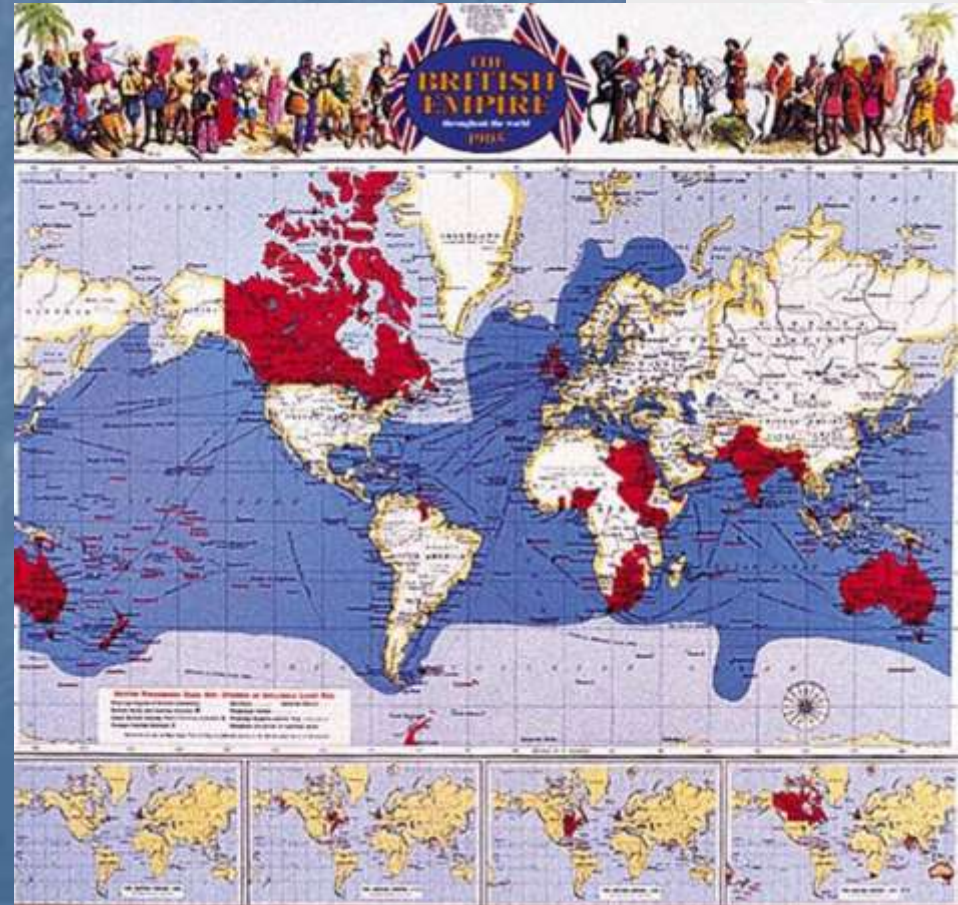

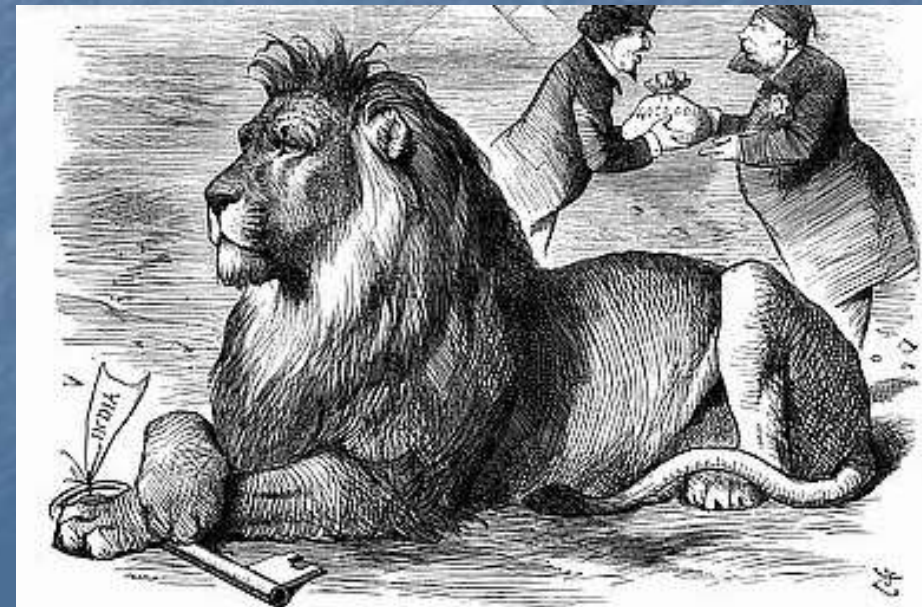
The New Imperialism
